

Extension Activities

Grammar Detective Stories: Students can write a short "Grammar Detective" story in which the characters solve mysteries related to the misuse of common words. The stories should include instances of the correct and incorrect use of these words. The correct use could lead the characters to solve the mysteries while the incorrect use could be a part of the problems they encounter.

Word Swap Puzzle: Students can create a "word swap" puzzle with sentences containing commonly mixed-up words. They can write sentences using these words, then swap the words with their commonly confused counterparts. Their task is to identify the errors and correct them. To make it more challenging, they can time themselves!




