

Extension Activities

Finding the Theme

STEP 1: Identify the **main idea** of the story – what actually happens to the characters. Let's use an example from *The Tortoise and the Hare*:

A hare challenges a tortoise to a race. The hare takes a nap during the race, and the tortoise wins.



STEP 2: Answer theme questions about the story:

- What did the characters learn?
- What's different at the end of

the story?

- How did they change or grow?
- Why did they act the way they
- What message stays with you?

STEP 3: Write a lesson that anyone can learn.

- **Slow down:** If you still need to finish reading your novel, this might feel challenging. That's OK! You can come back to this lesson later when you finish your book!
- Keep it universal: Make sure the theme can apply to lots of different people!
- **Test it out:** Use your theme to make a connection to another story, personal experience, or real-life event. If you can make a connection, you have a strong theme!

Revisiting The House on Mango Street

In *The House on Mango Street*, a girl named Esperanza dreams of a better life than the one she has in her small, crowded house in a struggling Chicago neighborhood. The book shares short stories about her year there, where she observes her family and neighbors. Esperanza notices that a lot of people around her are stuck – either because they don't have much money, they've faced tough times, or they've given up on their dreams.

Esperanza decides she doesn't want her life to be like that. She begins to understand the power of hope and the importance of being true to herself. Through writing, she finds a way to express her feelings and her dreams for a better future. She learns that even though life can be hard, holding onto your dreams can give you the strength to rise above your circumstances. Esperanza wants to get that nice house one day, but she also wants to come back and help make things better for the people she cares about.
