

Extension Activities

Day in the Life: Students stop throughout the day to take notes in an informal writing style – like a diary of their day. At the end of the day, they can use those notes to prepare a formal news segment or report to tell a friend or trusted adult about their day.

News With a Twist: Students can ask a trusted adult for help to find a news story and then rewrite it with an informal twist.

Formal Wear: Students create a stick figure cutout wearing a shirt. On the shirt, students write a sentence or two about a topic of their choice in an informal style. Then, create a cutout of a formal item of clothing, such as a suit jacket or dress. Students will now revise their writing to a formal style and write it on the formal clothing item. The new item of clothing can be placed on top of the stick figure to "dress it up." You could even use a paperclip to keep it in place. Now, the stick figure can dress "informally" or "formally" to help your student remember what they have learned.


Going to the Palace Activity
