

Extension Activities

Novel Speed Dating : Gather three to five books at your reading level that you've never read. You can do this at home, at the library, or even at a bookstore! Set a timer for five minutes. Skim through a book's cover, summary, and first page. When time is up, reset the clock and switch to another book. Think about which one captures your interest the most!

Wish List : Make a "Reading Wish List." Record the titles of books you have heard about or are curious to read. You can make a poster or a digital list. Check the books off as you continue your independent reading journey!

Island of the Blue Dolphins by Scott O'Dell: Based on a true story, it's about a young girl named Karana who learns to survive alone on an island off the California coast.

Treasure Island by Robert Louis Stevenson: Young Jim Hawkins sets sail on a dangerous adventure in search of buried pirate treasure.

The Call of the Wild by Jack London: The transformation of a domestic dog, Buck, as he answers the call of the wild in the untamed Yukon Territory.

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Mystery 🔍

Holes by Louis Sachar: Wrongly accused and sent to a desert detention camp, Stanley Yelnats digs holes and discovers family secrets.

From the Mixed-Up Files of Mrs. Basil E. Frankweiler by E.L. Konigsburg: Claudia and Jamie run away to the Metropolitan Museum of Art and uncover a mystery involving a beautiful statue.

The Westing Game by Ellen Raskin: A gripping mystery involving 16 heirs trying to figure out the cryptic will of a deceased millionaire.

Historical Fiction 🗾

Esperanza Rising by Pam Muñoz Ryan: From a life of luxury in Mexico to the labor camps of California, Esperanza navigates the challenges of the Great Depression.

Little House on the Prairie by Laura Ingalls Wilder: Laura and her family journey westward, facing the challenges and adventures of pioneer life.

Bud, Not Buddy by Christopher Paul Curtis: During the Great Depression, 10-year-old Bud goes on a quest to find his father, guided by a suitcase full of peculiar items.

Coming of Age 🌱

Because of Winn-Dixie by Kate DiCamillo: A summer in a new town becomes memorable for Opal after she adopts a dog she names Winn-Dixie.

The Crossover by Kwame Alexander: Basketball and family intertwine in this poetic story about teenage twin brothers Josh and JB.

Hatchet by Gary Paulsen: After a plane crash, Brian Robeson must survive alone in the Canadian wilderness with only a hatchet as his resource.

A Wrinkle in Time by Madeleine L'Engle: Meg Murry, with her brother and friend, journey through time and space to save her father from a cosmic evil.

The Chronicles of Narnia: The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe by C.S. Lewis: Four siblings step through a wardrobe into Narnia, a land frozen in eternal winter by a wicked witch.

The Phantom Tollbooth by Norton Juster: Bored Milo receives a magical tollbooth and embarks on a journey, discovering the importance of learning and imagination.

Realistic Fiction 🏠

Front Desk by Kelly Yang: 10-year-old Mia Tang manages the front desk at a motel where her parents work, all while navigating school and friendships.

Piecing Me Together by Renée Watson: Jade is a young artist from Portland, Oregon. She joins a mentor program for young girls and faces many challenges, like being treated differently because of her race.

Out of My Mind by Sharon M. Draper: Melody, a brilliant girl with cerebral palsy, finds her voice and fights to be heard in a world that often overlooks her.



*El Deaf*o by Cece Bell: The author gives a semi-autobiographical account of childhood experiences with hearing loss and the challenges and triumphs of growing up different.

Bone series by Jeff Smith: The Bone cousins, Fone Bone, Phoney Bone, and Smiley Bone, find themselves in a vast, uncharted desert filled with strange creatures and mysteries.

Smile by Raina Telgemeier: The author recounts a true story of her journey with braces, boy trouble, and friendship drama over the years.

Science Fiction 🛸

City of Ember by Jeanne DuPrau: In a city where darkness reigns, two kids discover clues to a mystery that could lead them to the outside world.

The Giver by Lois Lowry: In a world without pain, color, or memories, Jonas is chosen to be the Receiver of Memory, uncovering secrets about his community. As he learns more, Jonas faces tough choices.

The Time Machine by H.G. Wells: A time traveler journeys far into the future, discovering a world divided between the Eloi and the Morlocks.




