

Extension Activities

Fragment Fix-Up: Students will write 15 sentence fragments on individual slips of paper. They will put the papers in a hat and draw a fragment, then correct it by completing the sentence. Repeat until all fragments are fixed!

Story Generator: Students will need 10-15 index cards or slips of paper. On one side of the card or paper, have the students write sentence fragments. Then, place the cards facedown. Ask the students to select five to seven cards and attempt to convert the sentence fragments into complete sentences, integrating them into a coherent story.


