

The House on Mango Street is a special book written by Sandra Cisneros. It tells the story of a young Mexican American girl named Esperanza who lives in a poor neighborhood in a big city. The book is made up of short vignettes that show different moments in Esperanza's life.

In the book, Esperanza talks about her house on Mango Street, which is not like the houses she dreams of. Esperanza also tells us about the people she meets in her neighborhood and some of their stories, too. Through these encounters, Esperanza learns about friendship, family, and the challenges of growing up.

An important theme in the book is the power of words and writing. Esperanza loves to write and she dreams of becoming a writer. She believes that writing can help her escape her current situation and find her true identity.


